I. Introduction

A. Purpose

1. To provide strategic and operational guidance and coordinate state support of population protection operations throughout response and short-term, intermediate and long-term recovery.



B. Scope

1. State supported operations are scalable and modular based on the scope and magnitude of event and capability and capacity of the Authority Having Jurisdictions (AHJ).
2. A gubernatorial proclamation is required for certain assistance programs and processes.
3. For the purposes of the Illinois Emergency Operation Plan (IEOP), the term “population protection” is defined as, but not limited to, the following activities:
 - a) Crisis management;
 - b) Emergency management;
 - c) Emergency preparedness;
 - d) Contingency planning;
 - e) Security
 - f) Traffic and crowd control
 - g) Search and rescue operations
 - h) Population warning
 - i) Hazard exposure control;
 - j) Emergency medical care;
 - k) Reception and care of victims;
 - l) Dignitary protection;
 - m) Civil contingency, civil aid, civil defense, civil protection, and
 - n) Other functions of local and state law enforcement agencies for the purposes of maintaining order, enforcing laws and rendering services to an impacted population.
4. Population protection operations occur throughout the response and recovery operational phases.
5. This annex addresses parameters for utilization of population protection



resources and the procedures required for disaster operations.

6. This annex addresses support to local and county officials in the provision of essential population protection services as well as continuing day-to-day services.
7. Each type of population protection response requires different assets, expertise and equipment and/or specialized resources as appropriate.
8. Laws, rules, regulations and policies of the United States government and agencies involved in risk management, assessment, protective measures and prevention activities for population protection are considered applicable within the state.
9. This annex does not address Mass Care activities, as those are addressed in IEOP, Annex 7, Mass Care and its appendices.
10. This annex does not address Mass Care activities; see Annex 7, Mass Care and its appendices.
11. This annex does not address Access and Functional Needs (AFN) activities; see Annex 31, Access and Functional Needs.

C. Policy

1. The AHJ over a resource will retain command and control of that resource throughout response and recovery.
2. State response will not be dependent on federal response posture.
3. The governor of the state, or designee, will authorize and direct the use of state resources to provide support and assistance to population protection operations after consideration of both priorities and cost.
4. At the direction of the governor, or designee, state agencies may be tasked with providing agency personnel or resources in support of population protection operations.
5. State agency personnel or resources may be reassigned in accordance with the IEMA Act.
6. State agency personnel will be trained to the assigned mission and be made aware of potential risks involved.
7. Staff from responding agencies, organizations, and those deployed under mutual aid agreements or compacts are responsible for adhering to the



operational policies established herein.

8. Red Cross and The Salvation Army (TSA) maintain administrative, financial and operational control over their activities and direction over their own personnel.
9. The IEOP will not supersede Red Cross or TSA response and relief activities nor shall it require Red Cross or TSA to perform any services contrary to their policies and procedures.
10. Medical services provided at population protection facilities will not supersede local emergency medical services.
11. All services will be provided without unlawful discrimination as defined by the Illinois Human Rights Act.
12. Functional Needs Support Services (FNSS) for those with Access and Functional Needs (AFN) will be integrated throughout all aspects of population protection operations.
13. Service animals will be permitted to accompany their owners in all areas where the public is normally allowed to go.
14. Procedures for control and use of population protection resources will incorporate and/or consider operational priorities that include, but are not limited to:
 - a) Protection of life;
 - b) Public health and safety;
 - c) Property protection;
 - d) Environmental protection;
 - e) Restoration of essential utilities;
 - f) Restoration of essential program functions, and
 - g) Coordination as appropriate.
15. Personnel will be trained to assigned missions and be made aware of relevant policies and procedures and the potential risks involved.
16. Implementation of this annex will not supersede any AHJs policies or procedures.



17. Disaster intelligence collected through response will be provided to the SEOC.
18. Organizations providing law enforcement resources are responsible for training personnel in requirements, policies and procedures.
19. Population protection response by state agencies and state-approved mutual aid organizations will operate in accordance with policies and procedures.

D. Situation Overview

1. A natural, human-caused or technological disaster or incident (immediate, cascading or pre-planned) has or will occur resulting in a need to support the protection of the local population.
2. Damage to critical lifeline infrastructure has hindered or limited initial response efforts.
3. Population protection and emergency assistance services are required.
4. Local capabilities and resources (personnel, equipment, critical facilities and supplies) are engaged in response and recovery efforts and are insufficient due to the scope, nature and magnitude of the event.
5. Whole community coordination is necessary to affect timely and effective response and recovery.

E. Assumptions

1. Spontaneous humanitarian relief efforts will occur.
2. Communities providing relief and services, both those in affected areas and hosting displaced populations, will require population protection support.
3. State assistance will be required to support local response and carryout short, intermediate and long-term recovery efforts.
4. Existing mutual aid agreements, memoranda of understanding, memoranda of agreement, intergovernmental agreements, compacts and service agreements will be activated.
5. Ad-hoc mutual aid agreements, memoranda of understanding, memoranda of agreement, intergovernmental agreements, compacts and service agreements will be required.



6. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), in its role as coordinating agency for Emergency Support Function (ESF) #6 of the National Response Framework (NRF), will provide federal resources to assist and augment the state's capabilities.
7. Population protection operations will be prioritized against resource availability and capability and restoration efforts aimed at re-establishing critical infrastructure.
8. State assisted or coordinated population protection operations are required for an extended period.
9. Local and county law enforcement is prevented from effectively coordinating population protection activities.
10. Resources provided through the SEOC require coordination and management to ensure missions can be accomplished and avoid duplication of effort.
11. Spontaneous deployment of personnel will occur without a coordination element or sustainment plan.
12. Mutual aid assistance will be available at the local and state level.
13. Resources will be limited by location, training and operational readiness.
14. Specialized resources will be required.
15. Just-in-time training (JIT) will be required.
16. Support to high impacted areas will be extremely limited and delayed.
17. Communities outside the affected area, not including those designated as evacuee host communities, will continue to function indefinitely without state-activated population protection resource support.
18. Population protection resources will be required in evacuee host communities.

II. Concept of Operations

A. General

1. The Red Cross in coordination with IEMA will execute population protection operations throughout short-term, intermediate and long-term recovery.



2. The provision of disaster services by the Red Cross or other agencies and service organizations acting under their own authorities will not be dependent upon activation of the SEOC or a gubernatorial proclamation.
3. Red Cross response and recovery operations will conform to the American Red Cross Board of Governor's Disaster Cycle Services Policy Statements and will be performed in accordance with American Red Cross Disaster Cycle Services Regulations and Procedures.
4. The SEOC will coordinate integration of state agencies, private sector resources, non-governmental, voluntary and faith-based organizations required for execution of population protection operations.
5. Local governments have primary responsibility for population protection within their jurisdiction.
6. Request for state support will be directed through the SEOC.
7. State population protection support is based on resource availability, capability and prioritization of effort.
8. Personnel and resources activated by the state and coordinated by the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS) will be managed using Illinois State Police (ISP) processes and standard operating procedures.
9. For the purpose of population protection, the state maintains the following annexes, appendices and plans addressing specific related functions:
 - a) IEOP Annex 17, Long-term Community Recovery, addresses Disaster Housing and Human Services.
 - b) IEOP Annex 21, Volunteers and Donations Management, addresses volunteer and donations management and administration.
 - c) IEOP Annex 8, Public Health, Healthcare, EMS and Behavioral Health Services, addresses public health, healthcare, EMS and behavioral health services available through a variety of state agencies.
 - d) IEOP Annex 31, Access and Functional Needs (AFN), addresses the resources necessary to care for people with AFN.
 - e) The Illinois Plan for Radiological Accidents (IPRA) addresses



sheltering for nuclear power station response.

B. Notification, Alert and Warning (NAW)

1. SEOC NAW of SEOC liaisons will be handled in accordance with IEOP Base Plan, Appendix X-1, Notification, Alert and Warning.
2. Primary and support agencies are responsible for internal and support partner NAW.
3. IEMA will coordinate notification of Illinois Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (IL VOID) and share information about the incident and response actions.

C. Activation

1. The SEOC will provide state support through the activation of identified liaisons in accordance with the SEOC Activation Level Standard Operating Procedure (SOP).
2. The SEOC SOP Management and Coordination will be used to determine staffing levels necessary for population protection coordination and management.
3. The SEOC will activate the ILEAS SEOC Liaison Officer (LNO) for any event in which ILEAS has resources deployed for local-to-local support and/or at the request of ISP.

D. Communications

1. Communications throughout response and recovery will be conducted in accordance with standard operating procedures and managed using established procedures, processes and policies outlined in IEOP Annex 3, Communications.
2. Communications will be conducted in a National Incident Management System (NIMS) compliant manner utilizing clear-text and frequencies coordinated with the SEOC.

E. Resource Management and Logistics

1. Resource management and logistics will be carried out in accordance with IEOP Annex 9, Resource Management and Logistics.
2. Resource management includes mutual aid and assistance agreements, the use of federal and state teams and resource mobilization protocols.



3. Resource support to affected or host communities will be requested through the SEOC.

F. Reporting Requirements

1. Upon activation to the SEOC, all SEOC LNOs will compile and disseminate situational reports on population protection capabilities and services.
2. SEOC information, intelligence and situation reporting will be conducted in accordance with the SEOC Situation and Rapid Needs Assessment Standard Operating Guideline.

G. Implementation Requirements

1. Notification, activation, deployment, coordination, implementation and sustainment of state resources in support of population protection operations will be approved and coordinated through the SEOC.
2. Implementation of state-supported population protection operations is predicated on SEOC approval of a request for support.
3. Coordination and sustainment requirements of population protection operations must be fully addressed prior to implementation.
4. State support is not dependent on local or individual state agency response posture.
5. State support of population protection operations will require local jurisdiction resources to be fully engaged and/or their capability exceeded.
6. Implementation of population protection support is predicated on approval of a request from a local AHJ to the SEOC.
7. Coordination and sustainment requirements of population protection operations must be fully addressed prior to implementation of operations.

H. Safety

1. Population protection operations will incorporate operational priorities that include, but are not limited to:
 - a) Life;
 - b) Safety;



- c) Health;
 - d) Property protection;
 - e) Environmental protection;
 - f) Restoration of essential utilities;
 - g) Restoration of essential program functions, and
 - h) Coordination as appropriate.
2. All population protection operations will be conducted in accordance with laws, rules, regulations and policies of local and county jurisdictions, the state and federal governments.
- I. Organization
- 1. Direction & Control
 - a) State agencies and external organizations retain operational control of their resources.
 - b) The SEOC is the single point of coordination for state support of population protection operations.
 - c) Population protection resources approved and activated through the SEOC will follow internal chain of command.
 - i) Field command may be delegated to the AHJ or designated state agency as authorized by the SEOC.
 - ii) In such instances a designated state agency shall regularly report the status of resources and activities of the AHJ to the SEOC.
 - iii) Activated agency retains the discretion to extend its authority over field command at any time.
 - d) The Secretary of State (SOS) will maintain operational control of hazardous device units (HDU) and will cooperate with requests made to the SEOC based on operational priorities.
 - e) The SEOC Manager in coordination with the SEOC ISP LNO may establish Line of Effort (LOE) - Population Protection Support.



2. Coordinating Elements

- a) Emergency Management Assistance Teams (EMAT) may be assigned to support or coordinate local or state strategic operations.
 - i) For the purposes of support to local or state tactical operations, Incident Management Teams (IMT) may be assigned under the direct coordination and management of EMAT.
- b) State Unified Area Command (SUAC) and State Area Command (SAC) elements may be deployed by the SEOC to coordinate information and resource requirements.
- c) The SEOC SOS LNO will coordinate with the SEOC ISP LNO for prioritization of HDU resources.
- d) One or more LOEs may be implemented by the SEOC for specific strategic action planning for population protection.
 - i) LOE are responsible for short-term, intermediate and long-term operational planning, coordination and resource allocation.
 - ii) As directed by the SEOC Manager, LOEs will be coordinated and administratively supported by EMAT.
 - iii) LOE operate as strategic planning and coordinating elements of the SEOC and do not play an operational role.
 - iv) Additional agency staff will be assigned to LOEs based on the level of activation established by the SEOC.
 - v) Strategic and operational guidance on LOE operations can be found in IEOP Base Plan Appendix 4, Lines of Effort (LOE) Coordination and Management.

3. Federal Coordination

- a) SEOC LNOs, state agencies, boards and commissions will coordinate with federal counterparts in accordance with enabling authority.

III. Roles and Responsibilities



- A. American Red Cross (Red Cross)
 - 1. Coordinate mass care activities in accordance with IEOP Annex 7, Mass Care and its appendices.
 - 2. Coordinate the provision of basic health support services at Red Cross managed facilities.
 - 3. Coordinate the provision of Functional Needs Support Services (FNSS) for people with Access and Functional Needs (AFN) within Red Cross managed facilities.
 - 4. Assist in the establishment and maintenance of public information and messaging for the affected population.
- B. Illinois Capital Development Board (CDB)
 - 1. Coordinate administrative processes for construction of temporary population protection facilities and temporary housing.
 - 2. Assist in providing qualified staff or contractors to inspect the structural safety of population protection facilities.
- C. Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE)
 - 1. Maintain an updated list of primary and secondary response coordinators for each college and university campus.
 - 2. Coordinate the use of colleges and universities for population protection operations.
 - 3. Coordinate assignment of external resources and personnel with specialized skills (e.g., food service staff, foreign language interpreters, mental health personnel, health care personnel and logistics staff) available to assist in population protection.
- D. Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC)
 - 1. Coordinate with utility companies to arrange for high priority restoration of power and landline telephone services.
 - 2. Assist in coordinating the transportation of emergency supplies by rail.
- E. Illinois Community College Board (ICCB)
 - 1. Coordinate the use of community colleges as population protection



- facilities.
2. Coordinate assignment of external resources and personnel with specialized skills (e.g., food service staff, foreign language interpreters, mental health personnel, health care personnel and logistics staff) available to assist in population protection.
- F. Illinois Deaf and Hard of Hearing Commission (IDHHC)
1. Assist in providing interpreters for the deaf and hard of hearing.
- G. Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA)
1. Coordinate veterinary care, treatment, shelter and other essential services for household pets and service animals.
 2. Coordinate the use of state and county fairgrounds as population protection facilities.
- H. Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS)
1. Assist IEMA with the procurement of population protection resources.
 2. Assist in identifying translators and interpreters.
 3. Provide mobile vehicle maintenance support through traveling mechanics.
 4. Coordinate the use of CMS-managed state facilities and property, including state fuel depots and garages.
 5. Assist in recruiting state employees available for assignment at population protection facilities.
 6. Coordinate the purchase of state and federal surplus property.
 7. Support the recruitment of armed and unarmed security personnel.
- I. Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (IDCFS)
1. Assist with placement of children separated from parents and/or guardians.
 2. Coordinate financial assistance provision for wards of the state.
 3. Provide for youth support services.



4. Support coordination of emergency day care services.
 5. Provide subject matter experts and personnel with specialized training necessary for child protective services, to include support for unaccompanied minors.
- J. Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO)
1. Arrange for the provision and analysis of census data of disaster areas.
 2. Provide information on available housing, lodging and commercial space.
- K. Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC)
1. Provide individual in custody labor to assist with disaster recovery activities.
 2. Provide staff and support to population protection facilities.
 3. Coordinate assignment of external resources and personnel with specialized skills (e.g., food service staff, mental health personnel, health care personnel and logistics staff) available to assist in population protection.
 4. Coordinate the use of correctional institutions for the preparation of meals.
 5. Coordinate the use of correctional center laundry facilities.
 6. Arrange for storage of emergency supplies.
 7. Provide products from correctional Industries.
- L. Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (IDHFS)
1. Coordinate the provision of durable medical equipment from network providers.
 2. Provide lists of individuals in the Medicaid program who have been issued durable medical equipment.
- M. Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS)
1. Coordinate placement and support for clients and customers in IDHS facilities.



2. Support placement of individuals with Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (AODA) problems for whom congregate care facilities may not provide appropriate support.
 3. Support delivery of AODA prevention, outreach, intervention and treatment services throughout intermediate and long-term recovery.
 4. Dependent on capacity and resources, support assignment of external resources and personnel with specialized skills (e.g., food service staff, mental health personnel, health care personnel, private care attendants and logistics staff).
 5. Assist in identifying translators, interpreters and staff experienced in communicating with those with AFN and other diverse populations.
 6. Dependent on capacity and resources, support identification and coordination of facilities for feeding operations.
 7. Provide support and coordination, as outlined in IEOP Annex 17, Long-term Community Recovery, for the following:
 - a) Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program;
 - b) The Crisis Assistance Program, and
 - c) The Disaster Supplemental Food Assistance Program (DSNAP).
 8. Dependent on capacity and resources, assist with identification of staff to support population protection facilities.
 9. Support coordination of emergency day care services.
 10. Authorize state use of pharmaceuticals.
- N. Illinois Department of Innovation and Technology (DoIT)
1. Provide telecommunications support and technical assistance to state supported population protection facilities, personnel and the affected population.
 2. Coordinate the use of state information technology services to assist in family reunification and population protection.
- O. Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR)
1. Coordinate the use of state parks and agency owned facilities in support



of population protection operations.

2. Provide logistical support and boat/snowmobile transportation of population protection supplies, personnel and equipment.
3. Provide staff and support to population protection facilities.

P. Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH)

1. Coordinate with local health departments to ensure continuity of public health services.
2. Coordinate with Emergency Medical Services (EMS) systems and providers to ensure continuity of EMS services.
3. Coordinate with healthcare providers to ensure continuity of healthcare services.
4. Provide technical assistance for shelter operations including food safety, safe drinking water, sanitary waste disposal, vector control and structural pest control management.
5. Assist with determining appropriate healthcare facilities for persons determined not to be medically appropriate for placement in population protection facilities.
6. Coordinate the activation of volunteer disaster medical support based on resource availability.

Q. Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

1. Assist in providing transportation support for population protection operations during response and recovery.
- ~~2.~~ Assist in providing road condition reports.
3. Assist in identifying and locating facilities near state-owned transportation locations.
4. Assist in provide storage of population protection supplies.
5. Assist in providing road information and emergency highway signs to broadcast critical information.

R. Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA)



1. Coordinate the use of Illinois Veterans' Homes and agency owned facilities in support of population protection operations.
 2. Assist in the coordination of care for veterans.
 3. Coordinate assignment of agency health care personnel.
 4. Provide staff and support to population protection facilities.
- S. Illinois Department on Aging (IDoA)
1. Coordinate and support the implementation of state and federal disaster assistance programs to meet the needs of elderly populations.
 2. Assist with providing FNSS to older adult populations.
 3. Coordinate and manage contact with elderly populations and their caregivers in the community.
 4. Provide information on status and needs of elderly populations and their caregivers in the community.
 5. Support identification and provision of specialized personnel at designated population protection facilities.
- T. Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA)
1. SEOC Manager
 - a) Coordinate the provision of Disaster Housing and Human Services support outlined in IEOP Annex 17, Long-term Community Recovery.
 - b) Establish critical and essential information priorities.
 - c) Coordinate the transition from population protection operations to long-term community recovery activities.
 - d) Coordinate the state procurement of population protection resources.
 - e) Coordinate communications and logistical support including but not limited to the following:
 - i) Disaster intelligence support;



- ii) Public information; and
 - iii) Safety inspection of population protection facilities.
 - 2. Through the Radiological Task Force:
 - a) Provide assessment, dose projections and public information related to radiological events.
 - b) Coordinate Radiological Assessment Field Teams to measure radiation in the environment, collect environmental samples, ensure contamination control and sample chain of custody and analyze samples.
 - c) Coordinate radiological detection and decontamination at IPRA Reception Centers.
 - d) Support hospitals by providing technical assistance in establishing facility contamination control protocols and patient radiological surveys.
 - 3. Through memorandum of understanding with Illinois Emergency Services Management Association:
 - a) Provide staff and support to population protection facilities and operations at the local and state levels.
 - b) Provide generators to population protection facilities and operations.
- U. Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA)
 - 1. Provide technical assistance on operating and assessing public water supply and wastewater treatment infrastructure, as requested.
 - 2. Provide expertise on assessing and evaluating threats to public health, public welfare and the environment.
- V. Illinois Guardianship and Advocacy Commission (IGAC)
 - 1. Support and advocate for the rights of persons with disabilities.
 - 2. Provide lists of clients living in affected areas when requested.
 - 3. Make available or provide legal counsel to persons with disabilities where necessary and appropriate.



4. Assume legal guardianship of persons with disabilities where necessary and appropriate.
 5. Coordinate investigations of complaints alleging that the rights of a person with disability have been violated.
- W. Illinois National Guard (ILNG)
1. Coordinate the use of state-owned armories for population protection support functions.
 2. Provide logistical support and air/ground transportation of population protection supplies, personnel and equipment.
 3. Coordinate provision of resources for humanitarian aid and well-being services, life essential needs, and security.
- X. Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE)
1. Coordinate the acquisition and transportation of United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) commodity foods.
 2. Coordinate the use of schools as population protection facilities.
 3. Coordinate assignment of external resources and personnel with specialized skills (e.g., food service staff, foreign language interpreters, mental health personnel, health care personnel, private care attendants, nutritionists and logistics staff).
- Y. Illinois State Police (ISP)
1. Coordinate with applicable SEOC LNOs to identify the need for and, if needed, provide security.
 2. Coordinate the activities of law enforcement mutual aid resources activated through the SEOC in support of population protection.
 3. Coordinate with the Illinois Department of Juvenile Justice on the assignment of personnel with specialized training in juvenile services, including services for unaccompanied minors.
- Z. Illinois Secretary of State (SOS)
1. Coordinate use of state capitol complex facilities.
 2. Coordinate Capitol Police support.



3. Assist with the replacement of state identification, including drivers' licenses, state ID cards, vehicle titles and license plates.
4. Provide for the issuance of specialized identification for restricted access to population protection facilities.

AA. Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS)

1. Access and, if needed, provide security for population protection Operations.
2. Coordinate the activities of law enforcement mutual aid resources activated through the SEOC in support of population protection.
